From the Pastor's Desk

What kind of liturgical season is November? It doesn't seem to be part of the year of the Lord, when we follow the life of Jesus from birth through ministry to Passion and resurrection. Nor does it quite seem to fit with what we call the Sundays of ordinary time, when the lectionary readings tend to move us through gospel or epistle in a continuous fashion, without much regard for theme or season.

Which brings us to the question of, what kind of a season is November on the secular calendar? There too it seems unsure of its own character. Technically, of course, it's part of autumn. However, it doesn't really seem to fit. Where are the bright colors, the refreshing nip in the air? For many parts of the Northern Hemisphere, all of that has come and gone. The predominant color is more likely to be brown, and the novelty of the cooler air may have worn off. In some areas, snow may have already arrived. No, it doesn't feel at all like fall anymore, but it isn't really winter yet either. Even Thanksgiving seems not quite sure of itself. It's frequently late for a harvest festival, so we try to rush things a bit and make it the kickoff of the Christmas season.

November seems to be less of a season than a time in between, a period getting ready for a real season. It has its pleasures, of course, but somehow it's just not the real thing. If it has a theme of its own, perhaps it is the notion of promise, of something yet to come.

The liturgical calendar seems to do something similar with this month that doesn't quite fit. It begins with death, which to some may seem like a strange beginning. All Saints traditionally is a day for recalling those who have died in the past year. For many in our midst this is a difficult day, a day of recalling a loved one they have lost in the last year.

The annual Congregational Meeting will be held November 11 at 10:15 a.m. Items on the agenda include the election of four council members, four members of the next nominating committee, and presentation of the annual budget. Be sure to take part of this important meeting.

But the images of All Saints are not mournful ones. They are images not of what was and is no more, but of what will yet be. They are images of hope, of feasts shared and tears wiped away.

The following Sundays also look to a time to come. The writer of Hebrews tells of a time when Christ will come again, not to die for sin but to save the faithful. Jesus speaks of signs of the end times. Finally the month ends with the festival of Christ the King, with its images of fiery thrones, of Alpha and Omega, of a kingdom not of this world.

November is about promises. It is a time in between, moving us from 'not' to 'then.' As the calendar turns from one season to another, the church points us from one world to another. November says it is true the old is passing away, but more is to come. While the calendar holds the promise of December, and of the turn of a new year, faith promises a new world, a new king, a new life.

Even more than that, November is about reality, about what matters most. The place of this month in the calendar seems to suggest that what went before was important, and what is to come is more important yet, and the time in between is not quite real. In a similar way the liturgical calendar creates this non-season of November. It serves as a bridge from the activities of summer, of the life of faith lived fully, to the season of Advent, of awaiting the ultimate. "Look," it says, "the real is yet to come. Rejoice in what is here, but rejoice as well in what will yet be."

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CHURCH COUNCIL

News

From now on the newsletter will receive the minutes from each Council meeting, and starts by communicating highlights from the one just held in this article. Here are the main points from the meeting held in October.

Treasurer: The liquid investment fund is down to \$49,000.

Music and Worship: We have several instruments in repair. The grand piano needs \$2,000 worth of repairs, and the bells are currently at the repair shop, but their return has been delayed by an emergency at their plant. Scott Hildebrand is donating another piano to the church, and Jeff Arnold will organize the move.

Parish Education: Pastor reported that his teen Sunday school class is two or less each week. To engage them, they are discussing the upcoming 'Youth Winterfest' in lieu of a formal lesson.

Human Resources: Based on the October 7 budget hearing, the Contemporary Music Director's salary was renegotiated. The committee is also proposing that a volunteer be trained in the church office as to its organization and duties, to ensure consistency in case of an emergency or sudden changes in the day to day operations.

BUDGETARY HEARINGS ARE COMPLETE

It is hoped everyone was able to attend at least one of the meetings held to discuss the budget for 2013. This is the first year we have had pre-congregation meetings to discuss the details of the budget. Pastor Bill said he was very encouraged that the church membership is finally having open discussions about the fiscal future of the church. While there were heated debates at times, everyone was involved. It is very difficult to hear that we are in for some financial pain, but it is necessary for us to trim down to survive.

The main topics in the first meeting were salaries and charitable giving. (See the article on charitable giving by our church for more details.) Many questions were also asked about how the budget is formulated in the second meeting. Most figures for paying income, equipment, bills and repairs are estimated from previous years. Several line items were discussed such as the various charities to which we donate money, the cleaning service contract (we have a contract and long relationship with a company that is very receptive to our needs), and how the pastor's salary and benefits may or may not be used depending on when a new pastor is hired. (See the Call Update article for more details.) As of the writing of this article, at least two amendments will be presented at the annual meeting. They are a change in the Contemporary Music Director's budget and the deletion of the Rockyboy Charity in our giving. Amendments must be presented prior to the annual meeting and are voted up or down before the budget is voted on. The budget is also an up or down vote after the amendments are included as applicable during the annual meeting.

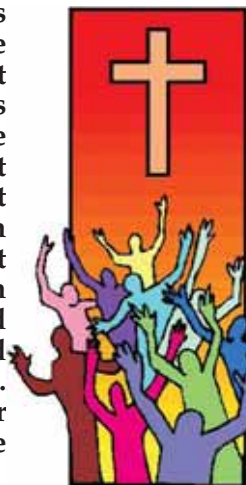
HYMNALS FOR CHRISTMAS

CALL UPDATE

Editor's Correction: Andrea Eveler-Stanley's name was inadvertently omitted from the Call Committee members list in the October newsletter. I apologize for omitting her name.

As reported in the October newsletter, we have been given a name from Synod, and the Call Committee has an interview scheduled on November 19.

During the budget hearings, the pastor's benefits package and salary were explained. The Synod requires us to pay our pastor based on experience, and it also requires certain percentages for pension and benefits. We will be calling a pastor with anywhere from 5 to 15 years of experience. The budget is estimating we call a pastor with 10 years experience, which is the median salary.

Food Pantry Ministry

Have you ever wondered just how our food pantry works, how it manages to accomplish the feeding of 250 families at least five times a year? Well, we all know that Jack Warntz is not Jesus and can't perform miracles like feeding with two loaves and five fishes, so there must be something special that happens down in that food room.

First, there are the many volunteers who give up a Saturday morning to come to help pack the nearly 750 boxes of food for our clients. We say "give up," but the workers have so much fun and fellowship they actually think they are getting something special on those days. Next, there is the transportation component of our food pantry. You may have noticed that our old truck, aptly named 'White Death,' is no longer parked at the block building. After nearly 11 years of service, the truck could no longer pass inspection and we had to search for a new, reasonably priced vehicle. With the help of Bob Strobeck, who searched many auto auctions looking for just the right truck, we finally found our NEW 2002 GMC truck with only 41,000 miles on the odometer. Of course, the roll-up door needs repair and we had to have it inspected, but it has already proven to be a wonderful blessing to our church. Because of the roll-up door, a skid of food boxes can be merely slid into the back of the truck instead of our workers having to unload the skid, pack the truck, unload the truck, move the materials through the lobby to the elevator, down to the food room, and then unpack the carts to place the boxes in the appropriate space. Since many of our volunteers are no longer young men, this saving of energy and body wear and tear is immeasurable. Thirdly, there was an anonymous donation and a generous donation from the American Legion that helped to underwrite the cost of our truck.

Because of these monies, Grace is still able to purchase most of the food for the Thanksgiving distribution. We do still need your help to purchase the 250 turkeys that will make our clients holiday one of real thanksgiving. Freezer space is available so that turkeys weighing 10-12 pounds can be dropped off any time before November 12, our distribution day. As we look at the community around us, we can feel proud that we are continuing God's work here in Red Lion and we still are considered the church that always helps! Keep up the good work, Grace members.

Tyler graduated with the Class of 2010 from Patapsco High School and Center for the Arts. He studied organ under the instruction of Dr. Jason Kissel, and previously studied piano and organ under Mrs. Kathie Metz. Tyler is currently a rising junior at Lebanon Valley College and studies organ and piano with Dr. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman. He is majoring in Music with a concentration in Organ Performance and Sacred Music.

Recently, Tyler was awarded first place in the AGO/Quimby Region III Competition for Young Organists. Tyler was presented with the John Philip Sousa Band Award and the Patapsco High School and Center for the Arts Music Department Talent and Achievement Award. He is also the recipient of several scholarships. In 2007, Tyler was the recipient of the Vernon de Tar Scholarship from the Delaware Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

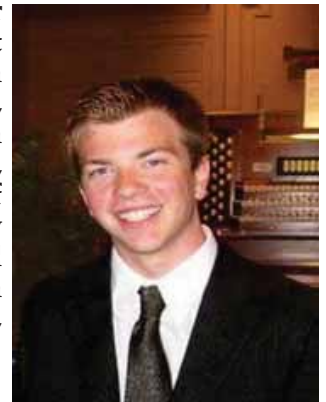
At First United Methodist Church in Palmyra, Pennsylvania, Tyler is the Organist and Director of Music. Tyler conducts the adult choir, two children's choirs, the youth choir and the handbell choir. He is the principal accompanist for the Harrisburg Men's Chorus.

At Patapsco High School and Center for the Arts, Tyler was active in the school's music program, performing in the wind ensemble, symphonic band, and jazz ensemble. He was the school's organist all

four years. Tyler was the assistant musical director for the school's main-stage musical productions and was the music director and pit conductor for the black-box musical productions. Tyler continues to be asked back to conduct the orchestra for the black-box musical productions.

Tyler was the organist and assistant choir director at Hope Presbyterian from May 2009 until August 2010. He was the Director of Music and Organist at Avon Zion United Methodist Church from October 2010 until August 2011.

Over the years, Tyler attended Pipe Organ Encounters in Maryland, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and Virginia. He also attended the Oberlin Conservatory Summer Academy in Ohio. Tyler has had the honor of being the substitute organist at many different churches in Maryland. Tyler has been a guest organist and a guest conductor in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Washington D.C., North Carolina, and Virginia. Tyler, his professor and some of his colleagues have recently returned from visiting and performing at the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Africa Inland Mission: Our heart is to see the worship of Jesus Christ spread across the continent of Africa – through individual lives fully committed to Him, and collectively through Christ-centered church communities. The Church in Africa is vast and growing daily. But with over 900 African people groups who have yet to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ, the task is far from finished.

Our missionary team is diverse, from outreach workers and church planters, to medical personnel, to a broad network of logistical and support personnel – pilots, teachers, accountants, engineers, IT workers, and more.

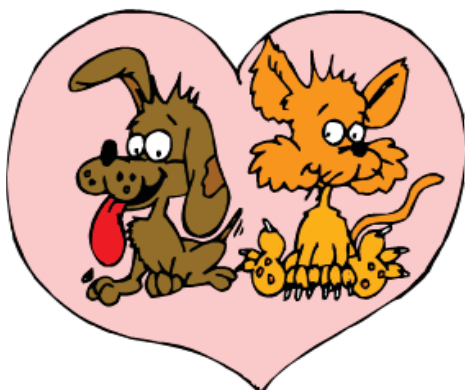
Together, we're committed to being and making disciples of Jesus Christ.

Rocky Boy Mission: The Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation is an Indian reservation of the federally recognized Chippewa Cree Tribe located in the U.S. state of Montana. It was established by Executive Order in 1916. Its government is the Chippewa-Cree Business Council, organized in 1935 by its constitution. The Chippewa Cree tribe operates the Northern Winz Casino. Construction began in May 2006, with the tribal grand opening occurring in February 2007, and a public grand opening March 30, 2007. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has long maintained a mission, Our Savior's Lutheran Church, at the reservation. Toward the end of 1999,

Rev. Joseph W. Bailey Sr. was joined by Christian youth groups from around the country; together they built a new sanctuary and outdoor chapel, and started work on a retreat center. (Taken from: www.wikipedia.com search topic: Rocky Boy Mission)

Pa Council of Churches: We are 42 church bodies and agencies representing 20 Anabaptist, Anglican, Orthodox, Pentecostal, and Protestant communions in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania working together for Christian unity for the sake of the world. Through the Pennsylvania Council of Churches, our member church bodies "...seek to manifest their fellowship with one another, to engage in common activities of witness and service, and to advance towards the goal of visible unity."
