



From the Pastor's Desk

It's Happening at Grace
Lutheran!

As we fumble our way out of bed in a winter morning that seems more like night, Isaiah's words "Arise, shine for your light has come!" (Isaiah 60:1 New International Version) may sound ironic, even sardonic. Still, we know that the prophet's words have no connection at all to the changing of the seasons. No, they come to us in the context of our Lord's revelation as the beacon of salvation for the whole world. In response, the Epiphany season calls us, entices us, even commands us to rise up, to leap out of those places where we live in spiritual darkness. God calls us to polish our glasses, clean our windows to be able to see with clarity this new thing that has happened. Arise! Shine! We are invited to greet and welcome the light – a luminescence that shines with such magnitude that it melts the icy coldness of our hearts. Epiphany is no wimpy one-candle-in-the-darkness deal, but rather a blast of brightness not seen before. Get up and see it! Bask in its brightness. Behold the light that shines upon us, scattering the darkness of our minds so that we may walk as children of light.

The light is Christ. Any spiritual light that we have is his, shining in and through us. Indeed, so great is the grace that shines upon us that it seems that our faces, like Moses', should be glowing with reflected glory. At the very least, our way of living surely will catch the light of Christ's love and shine it on those around us. Such is the extroverted, mission oriented nature of this season.

Although the people are the church and thus will be the primary light-givers in this season, our center of worship too should glow with light. Don't let Epiphany be wimpy. Let everything associated with our worship shine in celebration that the light of our lives is living among us. Polish the metal, light the candles and let us shine full blast. Our church should be a beacon, a searchlight calling out to all who are in spiritual darkness.

Epiphany begins at Bethlehem, but it deserves to be more than a half-baked rerun of Christmas. The magi followed an unmistakably bright star previously unknown, a luminous sign from God to pay attention. During the season of Epiphany we also celebrate the baptism of Jesus, introducing the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire.

The brightness carries on through the season. At Cana, Jesus does the first of his signs. The rabbi Jesus proclaims the recovery of sight for the blind. Jesus is a light seemingly too intense for some in his hometown. He invites others into the circle of his light, inviting fisherman to pull in people. Christ is a light that shines where none has before, blessing the poor, the hungry, the sorrowful. Finally we have the dazzling light of the transfiguration.

This light is for all people: "a light for revelation to you and for glory to your people Israel" in the words of Simeon (Luke 2:32 New International Version). This light and fire of God shines like a therapeutic laser right into the places where it is most needed. This cleansing light sears away the scales on our eyes, cauterizes the seeping wounds of sin, and halts the gnawing darkness of anxiety. This is a healing light, a refining light, a burnishing light and a purifying light. This light is like no other. This light has the power to save.



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The Council met on December 13. The following article is a summary of the minutes submitted by Council Secretary, Beth Kollosch.

The first item was to review and approve the minutes from September and October. The minutes from the special council meeting held on November 11 were reviewed, and Jeff Arnold corrected the amount needed to repair the roof from the estimated dollar figure of \$750 submitted last month to \$850, which passed by motion. The Property committee submitted their report, that a heater was installed in the nursery, the steeple repair is underway, and roof repairs will follow.

The Human Resources committee has been working very hard lately to bring the church's paid staff in line with contemporary non-profit business practices. They have prepared revised contracts for two of the paid positions to reflect the changes approved

as part of the 2013 budget. Annual reviews for two more of the paid positions still need to be completed, hopefully before the closed of 2012. President Ken Turner inquired into the status of job descriptions in light of the discussions during the budget hearings. The committee reports that they are working on them. Additionally, the committee recommends that a new pictorial directory be prepared in the near future. A discussion on background checks for volunteers and staff that work with children and youth was also introduced. The youth group will not be attending Winterfest as originally planned, as background checks were not yet completed on available adults.

In new business, the council agreed that the paid staff should receive a Christmas gift of a \$50.00 gift card. The Council would also like to officially recognize Jeffery Cogan for all the many things he does above and beyond his job description.

'THE BEACON' GOES ONLINE



If you receive the newsletter via email, you may have noticed this month that, instead of the usual extensive address list and an attached file, you were sent an individual message with a link. That is because we are now connected with an email service called

Mail Chimp. Mail Chimp is a free service that enables the church to have a secure account for electronic mailings. We can create mailing lists and send links to individuals. This gives privacy to our members and simplifies the emails you receive. For example, if you get *The Beacon* via your phone, it may be very annoying to scroll through the other email addresses to reach the copy, and your device may have difficulty opening attachments. Perhaps you are someone who prefers that all the other addressees do not see your email address. Mail Chimp makes all these issues go away by sending you a link to the website each month. As a result of us posting online, you can access old issues without needing to save them to your hard drive or searching your old emails for what you want to reread. Our webmaster has already put the back issues from September 2012 onward on the website.

Another advantage of Mail Chimp is to customize email lists for different purposes. For example, if we have a list of members with children, we can send notices that may be of interest to them, but not to members who do not have young children. If anyone would like to create an address listing for something he or she coordinates, please contact the webmaster. Mail Chimp is simple to use and easy to learn. It is a great way to stay in touch with your group and advertise what you are doing in and around the church.

With the introduction of Mail Chimp, we are in need of updating the email address list. It has come to the editor's attention that some emails are out of date or wrong. Rest assured that your email address will only be used for things you personally sign up for. Please contact the editor or webmaster to update your email information. If you know of someone who would be interested in receiving *The Beacon* via email, we can have up to 10,000 email addresses, the more the merrier!

If all this sounds like a foreign language and you prefer a paper copy, issues will still be printed and available in the church. Paper readers can also access old issues by contacting the editor any of the ways listed in the submission box ad on this page.

CALL UPDATE

The Call Committee has met with the potential candidate and was very impressed. This candidate is a seasoned minister and has experience in both contemporary and traditional formats. The next step in the process is for the council to call a special meeting to meet the candidate and vote on whether or not he is a good fit for our church. The council is making it a priority to have this meeting as soon as possible in January. If the meeting bodes well, look for a date to be scheduled for the congregation to meet the candidate.

'STRANGERS IN KENYA' ON A UNITED STATES ADVENTURE

Not to us, O Lord

Rift Valley Academy (RVA) features a number of special songs at its yearly graduation ceremony. My favorite is a song called "Not to us, O Lord." The refrain to that song continues, "...but to Thy name be glory, and to Thy name be praise." This song held extra meaning for me this past July. On graduation night, we left on the red-eye flight from Nairobi back to America for our second home assignment (or furlough) of the past seven years. Home assignment can be dangerous for missionaries, as there is a lot of focus on "us." We're the guest speakers, we're the long-lost friends, and we're the special visitors. On top of that, we also get to enjoy the simple luxuries of life in America again, which are indeed extra cherished after years in a developing country. As we prepared

for this home assignment, I felt God put a succinct prayer in my heart. Despite a natural desire to "take a break," I wanted to more passionately make an impact for the kingdom during our time home. I feel like this awareness and desire made our five months in America extra special. We were given the main Sunday pulpit in 12 different churches. We were blessed with chances to speak at another dozen small groups or home fellowships. Although we didn't meet with all of our individual supporters, we did have precious one-on-one times with over 60 individuals or families. Within these many events, we can testify to very powerfully sensing the Spirit of God working around us. We feel like the glory in this home assignment was "not to us," but to the Lord.

Things we were able to take away from our home assignment

We were both able to attend a one day Advanced Placement seminar in October. Heather went to explore future possibilities for the Social Studies Department at RVA, and Ryan went to pick up greater skills for English Literature. Ryan attended another class at Bethel Seminary during home assignment, thanks to designated gifts from supporters. He is working towards an eventual chaplaincy degree to further his spiritual impact on students at Rift Valley Academy. We were able to focus on our marriage for a weekend in November as we attended a Family Life marriage conference. God continues to strengthen us as a couple so we can lead our children and tackle our exciting ministry in Kenya.

We were fortunate to have a great public school in our San Diego neighborhood. The boys settled in well to third grade (Micah) and kindergarten (Asher) and thrived during their semester there. Ryan, Heather, and Claire used the daytime hours to meet with supporters and take classes. In addition to speaking at 12 different churches during our five months in the USA, Ryan also met with a former RVA student who is attending Point Lorna Nazarene University (our alma mater as well). God bless you as you stand behind us!

We are thankful for great transitions for the children between Kenya, Pennsylvania and California. We had many fruitful speaking opportunities during our stay in the US. AFTER THANKSGIVING ... A TIME FOR GIVING THANKS!

After a record breaking year, with a grand finale of feeding 281 families at Christmas, it is time to give thanks to all who helped make the food pantry and its ministry possible. First, thanks to all the volunteers who give up their Saturday morning in bed to come to help pack those nearly 1000 boxes every time we distribute food. Going round in circles doesn't seem like it would be fun but the workers laugh and really do enjoy their time together. Next, we want to thank those church members who routinely designate their benevolence to be given directly to the food bank. With a 20% reduction in state funding, we were concerned that we would have to cut back on how much food we give to each family, but your continued support has made it possible for us to maintain our usual amount of giving.

Another group of volunteers that deserves appreciation are those who come on those Sunday afternoons to set up the sanctuary for our yard sale ministry. This ministry continues to grow through the generous donations of our church members, friends and even the community. The boxes of gently used clothing, bedding, towels and washcloths, household and kitchen utensils, books, shoes and especially toys help to provide much needed articles for our clients. Imagine being able to "shop" for free! You have no idea how overwhelming it is to set up 20 tables, and bring untold bags and boxes from downstairs from stairwells and every nook and cranny to be unloaded for distribution. At Thanksgiving, we had 43 volunteers who madly attacked those bags and boxes and in a little over one hour completed the daunting task! The yard sale ministry has become so important to our clients that they arrive in our parking lot at 6:30 a.m. on those Monday mornings to be first into the sanctuary to "shop" for things. They know that they are guaranteed to get food, but they want first dibs on the unknown goodies waiting for them. The volunteers who come on Monday to serve as helpers in the Sanctuary are rewarded time and time again with a smile, a hug and of course, a great big, "Thank you!" The yard-sale ministry isn't finished when the people

are done shopping, however, because now we have volunteers who pack up the remains either for saving for next time or for donating to the Salvation Army. Even though they may have been at church since 8:00 a.m., those same workers willingly pack and move many boxes out of the sanctuary and into designated waiting spaces for further use.

We can't forget the ladies who work in the office to process the claims of all of our clients. Each client has to be interviewed, assisted with paper work and then pleasantly sent on their way. Talk about hand cramps and cheek cramps! We have to especially remember the men and women who work outside in the alley through heat, cold, rain and snow to pack the waiting cars with their boxes. Unfortunately, the cars are often already loaded with miscellaneous articles, packing our boxes into their remaining space is a real challenge. Our workers are up to the task, however, and somehow always manage to get everything in there. What would a Lutheran ministry be without food! We definitely need to thank the ladies who stand for hours in the Welcome Center to serve the coffee, hot chocolate and cookies to our clients as they wait for the processing to begin. By serving our clients we show them a level of respect that they often don't get and certainly appreciate. You can't imagine how many times we hear, "thank you," during the morning.

There is one more person who needs to be thanked and that is Pam who cleans up all of our messes on Tuesday morning. She vacuums up the crumbs and litter from the Welcome Center and Sanctuary, makes sure the bathrooms are now clean and restocked with toilet paper and takes out all of our trash. By Tuesday morning, we are all pretty tired, so it is comforting to know that we don't have to return to the church to clean up the left-overs! Lastly, we have to thank God for opening our hearts and minds to willingly do the work that he has intended for us and giving us the opportunity to experience the joy and love that comes from serving others.

Healthy Living WITH ASTHMA

Many of our parishioners have asthma or breathing problems. We are including an article on asthma as we keep the doors and windows tightly closed for winter. During our Thanksgiving Eve service we used incense during the program and it triggered several peoples' respiratory symptoms, causing some to have to leave the church. By knowing more, we can help those who come to church breathe a little easier!

There are many things that can trigger an asthma attack. One trigger can cause an asthma attack. Many triggers together may cause asthma to flare up! Asthma triggers can add up to an asthma attack.

Common Asthma Triggers

- dust mites in fabrics
- strong perfumes, body lotions, powders or sprays
- windy days (kick up dust and pollen)
- smoke of any kind, including a lingering smoke smell or incense
- animal skin, hair, urine and saliva
- cleaning liquids and sprays
- colds or sickness that causes airways to constrict
- weather changes
- exercise
- outbursts of emotion
- certain foods
- freshly cut grass and plants that contain pollen

If we are all more sensitive, we can help to have a safe and happy worship. Please consider what is around you when you prepare to come to church and ensure that you do not carry asthma triggers with you.

All contacts should be made using the contact form on the site itself, which has a drop-down menu of persons to write to; “Webmaster” being one of them.

A Dynamic Website


Grace Lutheran wants to have a dynamic website where people can find all the church news not much later than when they happen or become available. Our new site has two ways of dealing with this:

1. We have a “blog” where news items are posted and listed chronologically. It’s not exactly a free for all, but as long as an item is from any of our church members and addresses anything that is relevant to our congregation, it can and should be posted there. If you have anything to convey to our parish in this regard, please be so free and send it to our webmaster. We must reserve the right, however, to decide whether, and if so, when an item will be posted. If there is doubt about an item’s suitability, our pastor will make a final decision in this regard. Many, if not most items submitted for posting on our blog will also be considered for reprinting in Grace’s newsletter *The Beacon*. Some time-insensitive items might even be withheld from the blog until they have been published in the newsletter – so that the newsletter really has something new and isn’t a mere regurgitation of our blog.

2. We have a sophisticated calendar of events. However, that calendar is only as good as the people who maintain it. Therefore, if you have any church event that’s brand new or that’s missing in our calendar, please be so kind and let our webmaster know so he can enter it.

GraceLutheran.com is our window to the world. In a world dominated by the Internet, this site is our most important means of reaching out to potential new members. Therefore, we ought to make this virtual showcase as attractive as possible. As with everything else, we can achieve this ambitious goal only if we work together on this. We kindly ask everyone in our congregation who gets involved in any activity to think about informing our webmaster about it before it happens, so others will find out about it prior to the event and have a chance of joining in. Our organizers should also think about writing something nice and informative about the event after it has happened, in order that the world can learn about the many interesting and uplifting activities of our vibrant community.





THE GOOD NEWS AND THE BAD NEWS REGARDING THE TREE GIVEAWAY

Thanks to all who participated in our Christmas Tree Charity Program. We were able to send over \$430 to four charities that help out the poorest of the poor throughout the world, our own food pantry, and a contemporary Christian music radio station that broadcasts worldwide on the internet. Charities which benefitted were: Heifer Project International-\$130, Grace Lutheran Food Pantry-\$115, Smile Train-\$50, Food for the Poor-\$45, Feeding America-\$45, and radio station WJTL, 90.3FM-\$45.

I got a chance to look back at my records over the last 15 years, since I have been having people chose the charity to which they want to give, and the bad news is this has been the second worst year for giving trees away. We only had nine families participate. The highest year of tree giveaways was 1999 when 74 trees were given away. The good news is this was the second best year for donations per trees given away. This year's ratio was \$46.70 per tree given away. Our best year for total donations was also 1999 when a total of \$1074 was donated. We did so well, because one member made a donation, but did not get a tree or any greens, two other members got both a tree and greens, and one donated over two times their value, and the other donated over three times their value. Again, I say, "thank you," to all who helped in any way.

Remember, those of us that have clothes to wear in the winter and summer, a warm house in the winter, a roof over our heads, plenty of food to eat, a vehicle to get around in, and the freedom to worship as we please, are richer than at least 75% of the world's population. This means that we are living better than 4.5 billion people. We should not only thank God during this very special season, but we should thank God on a daily basis for all His gifts to us.
